Separation and communion; Communion rail kneeler cushions being reupholstered

Dear friends,

Have you ever visited a place or had an experience that suddenly reminded you of a person you had lost? Perhaps someone who moved away, or who passed away from this life? The memory can come back in such a way that brings a twinge of sadness, perhaps regret, and perhaps a feeling of powerlessness over an unkind fate. The memory can bring back a longing to be with that person again, to overcome the separation, however impossible that might be.

Our readings today show us a power of separation and loss, but they also reveal an even greater power of communion.

In our first reading from Genesis, we hear about a series of profound separations.

Originally, Adam had a deep communion of trust and friendship with God in the Garden of Paradise. But as we hear in our reading from Genesis, after our first parents eat of the forbidden tree, they try to hide—separate themselves—from God. A little later we learn of a new division between Adam and Eve—rather than seeking forgiveness for their wrongful actions, they blame one another. And then we learn of their separation from the Garden of Paradise and the Tree of Life. There is even a new separation that enters between human persons and the rest of creation: not only is there enmity between the woman and the serpent (though there was already enmity between Satan and humanity), but we later learn that Adam will need to raise food from the earth by the sweat of his brow, while the earth will bear him thorns and thistles.

In our Psalm, we hear about the experience of deep separation, and the cry from the heart to God to return us, through his mercy, into communion and peace:

Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD;

LORD, hear my voice!

*Let your ears be attentive
to my voice in supplication.*

If you, O LORD, mark iniquities,

LORD, who can stand?

*But with you is forgiveness,
that you may be revered.*

In our Gospel, however, we hear about a powerful and beautiful force of communion.

The force of communion is Jesus. Jesus, in the passage just preceding our Gospel passage today, has called the twelve apostles *to be with him*. He also is going to send them forth to preach and drive out demons. Jesus also draws many other people to himself. At the beginning of our Gospel passage today, so many people have come to be with Jesus that it was impossible for him and his apostles to eat. Some of the crowd tells him that his mother and his brothers and

sisters are outside asking for him (some of his relatives think he is out of his mind), but he looks around at those seated in a circle around him; at those who have come to be with him, to listen to him, and to become friends of God. Jesus declares: *“Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother.”*

There are some who cannot understand the power that Jesus has to draw so many people to himself. Some of the scribes think this is some deceit of Satan. But Jesus points out that it defies logic to believe that Satan has risen up against himself. Rather, by the power of God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, Satan (the strong man in the parable) is bound up, and those held captive are set free.

In our second reading, we hear about the beautiful but challenging path that leads each disciple into communion with Christ.

Those who *do* join themselves to Christ—who plant themselves beside him to listen to him and do the will of his Father—will indeed become his friends; indeed, his very family. Yet they will not be immune from troubles and afflictions, as we hear in our Psalm and second reading. They will have to wait and keep watch for him, as sentinels do. They will sometimes feel overwhelmed and will have to cry out from the depths in their prayer. Yet they know that Christ too was overwhelmed in his passion and death on the cross before he rose from death on the third day, and so, the friends of Christ do not surrender to discouragement:

Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal.

The forces of separation, in the end, will not prevail. When we plant ourselves in the presence of Christ as his friends, we should expect momentary afflictions. But we should never forget that they are only momentary from the standpoint of eternity.

Christ, the new Adam, overcomes the exile and separation unleashed by our first parents. In a beautiful and ancient homily on Holy Saturday, Christ—after his death on the cross and before his resurrection—descends to the realm of the dead to set our first parents free. He plunders Hell—the strong man’s house. Notice the tremendous and beautiful power of Christ to bring the lost and separated back into communion:

Something strange is happening — there is a great silence on earth today, a great silence and stillness. The whole earth keeps silence because the King is asleep. The earth trembled and is still because God has fallen asleep in the flesh and he has raised up all who have slept ever since

the world began. God has died in the flesh and Hell trembles with fear.

He has gone to search for our first parents, as for a lost sheep. Greatly desiring to visit those who live in darkness and in the shadow of death, he has gone to free from sorrow the captives Adam and Eve, He who is both God and the Son of Eve. The Lord approached them bearing the Cross, the weapon that had won him the victory. At the sight of him, Adam the first man he had created, struck his breast in terror and cried out to everyone, 'My Lord be with you all.' Christ answered him: 'And with your spirit.' He took him by the hand and raised him up, saying: 'Awake, O sleeper, and rise from the dead, and Christ will give you light.

'I am your God, who for your sake have become your son. Out of love for you and your descendants I now by my own authority command all who are held in bondage to come forth, all who are in darkness to be enlightened, all who are sleeping to arise. I order you, O sleeper, to awake. I did not create you to be held a prisoner in Hell. Rise from the dead, for I am the life of the dead. Rise up, work of my hands, you who were created in my image. Rise, let us leave this place, for you are in me and I in you; together we form one person and cannot be separated....

'Rise, let us leave this place. The enemy led you out of the earthly Paradise. I will not restore you to that Paradise but will enthrone you in heaven. I forbade you the tree that was only a symbol of life, but see, I who am life itself am now one with you. I appointed cherubim to guard you as slaves are guarded, but now I make them worship you as God. The throne formed by cherubim awaits you, its bearers swift and eager. The Bridal Chamber is adorned, the banquet is ready, the eternal dwelling places are prepared, the treasure houses of all good things lie open. The Kingdom of Heaven has been prepared for you from all eternity.'

This is also my last weekend with you at St. Patrick as your pastor, and I find goodbyes difficult, for they are one of those forces of separation, and they can feel overwhelming.

Our beautiful Catholic faith, however, remind us that the affliction of saying goodbye is momentary from the standpoint of eternity. For as you have come here to St. Patrick to plant yourselves near Christ, you now are his own brothers and sisters, and his power to draw us out of any dark place or out of any painful separation is absolute. Even death and all the forces of darkness cannot withstand his power to draw his friends back into communion with him. And if we are in communion with him, we are also in communion with each other.

Christ has such a tremendous and beautiful power to restore the lost into communion that no one who humbly but truly follows him to the end will be lost; all those who truly seek him will find him, and be restored to the

communion with the Father who—like the father in the parable of the Prodigal Son—desires for his wayward children to come home, and prepares for them a great feast.

So, when I have to say goodbye to those I have come to know and love, and when the memory suddenly returns of someone lost through separation, I try to remember that power of Christ to draw us back into communion with him and with all the saints; the power to bring us home to paradise.

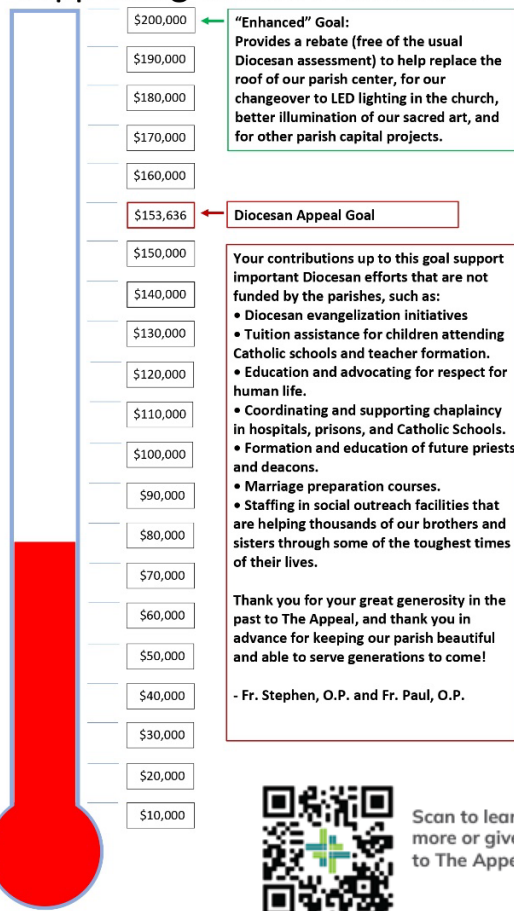
